Dear Parents and Community Members:

We are pleased to present you with the Annual Education Report (AER) which provides key information on the 2014-15 educational progress for Centreville Elementary. The AER addresses the complex reporting information required by federal and state laws. The school's report contains information about student assessment, accountability, and teacher quality. In the past two years, staff has worked hard to meet the challenges that come with staff movement between grade levels, changes in teaching assignments, and/or implementing new curriculum. Staff has also been challenged with higher class sizes. In the 14-15 school year, we implemented a new math curriculum, Eureka Math. We believe one result of change was an implementation assessment dip that we experienced in the Spring M-STEP scores. In the 15-16 school year, we will be implementing a new reading curriculum, Reading Street. In upper elementary science, we have also implemented Battle Creek Area Science Kits. All curricular changes have been made to meet the rigor of Michigan Standards. Therefore, with staff changes and new curriculums, the staff and students have been challenged with many obstacles and growing pains. We believe the long term results will be very positive and will result in strong student growth once we are fully implemented. The following were our Spring 2015 M-STEP Results which report percent of students proficient in each grade level and subject area assessed:

1. All Centreville students, as well as those families who wish to apply for Schools of Choice, are welcome to attend and will be assigned to classes.
2. Our Centreville Elementary School Improvement team worked hard again this year revising and updating the School Improvement Plan in the MDE's system, ASSIST. We are a Schoolwide Title 1 school allowing us to serve all students in a multi-tiered system of support which our data shows has been successful at meeting the needs of more of our students. Our SIP plan is focused on providing training and support to staff, as well as, communication to parents. The professional development planned for the 2015-16 school year and building goals were tightly aligned with the plan. 3. We do not have a specialized school.
4. A copy of our core curriculum may be obtained from Mrs. Lester, District Curriculum Director and Mrs. Stauffer, Principal. Eureka Math, which was implemented during the 14-15 school year in grades K-6, is aligned with Michigan Standards. Reading Street will be implemented for grades K-6 during the 15-16 school year to provide curriculum that meets the rigor of CCSS and Michigan Standards. We began the implementation of the BCMSC kits in upper elementary science classes in the 14-15 school year and will add more kits for the 15-16 school year. The kits are aligned to the Michigan Science Standards and offer the opportunity for hands on learning. The use of technology and integrating into our instructional practices was a focus in 14-15, as we participated in the TRIG grant. In the 15-16 school year, we are adding 90 more Chromebooks to increase use of technology and implement our learning from TRIG. We will be at a 2:1 device ratio for grades 3-6. Our goal continues to be to provide transparency to our parents and community by linking our curriculum to our website for all staff and parents to view. Learning goals are included in weekly newsletters that go home at all grade levels.
5. We assess the reading and math skills of all students at the beginning, middle, and the end of the school year using the Renaissance STAR program and Dibels Next. Below is the data for the 13-14 and 14-15 school years:

6. 85.8% (#357) of our students were represented by parents at Parent-Teacher conferences in 2013-14 school year. In the 2014-15 school year, 89% (#352) of our students were represented by parents at Parent-Teacher conferences. Third-sixth grade parents may also access student grades in PowerSchool. Centreville Elementary is a school with high academic expectations for students and families. Our mission at Centreville Public Schools, including Centreville Elementary, is to educate all students to succeed as productive citizens in a global community. In preparing our students for success in a global community, we provide our students with not only academic excellence but with many opportunities to enhance the growth of the whole child.

We have a part time school counselor who coordinates our anti-bullying program and character education classes. We have a school wide behavior support system and utilize Dojo to monitor, reinforce, and communicate behavior and work habits with parents. We reinforce positive behaviors, including work ethic, responsibility, and perseverance, through our monthly STAR student and Growth Mindset student recognition assemblies.

Our PAC (parent advisory committee) is very active in providing opportunities for our children and parents to enjoy time together with a Family Dance, Movie Night and support many of our family curriculum nights. PAC also helps with improvements on the playground, Fall Festival in conjunction with our high school AG class, track and field day, Popcorn Friday, and various opportunities for the little things that mean so much to children. PAC is also supportive of our curricular needs by purchasing supplies for the classrooms.

We support the arts. All students have visual art class at least once a week. Students and parents were invited to attend an Art on Canvas evening. All students in grades K-4 participated in a musical displaying their vocal talents. Our 6th graders have the opportunity to begin their music career by joining band.

Our Physical Education teacher, Craig Brueck, hosts a monthly All Pro Dads breakfast. This is a Christian based program that promotes the healthy relationship between dads and their children. Craig supports students through "Jump Start" each morning which is a time for students who need movement to help them get ready to learn. This has been successful and our data shows a reduction of discipline during the morning hours for those students participating.

Our Title 1 program supports educational evenings for our families. One evening is in conjunction with our March is Reading month to encourage our families to read outside of school. We also host a math game night for families. Both events are well attended.

Extracurricular activities available to our students include: 6th grade band, Clue-Me-In, Young Author Day, and athletics through the Jr. Pro sports program. We offer every grade level multiple opportunities for field trips, such

as: 4th Grade Camp, Lansing State Capitol trip, Amigo Centre, Sauder Village, Binder Park Zoo, local musical productions, etc.

Our students learn the importance of community by participating in our annual Angel Tree at Christmas, Relay for Recess, supporting local Torch Run for ISD students, local food drive, penny drive for the animal shelter, and donations of shoes, school supplies and clothing for our students.

Through the efforts of our staff, families, and community we are able to develop the social, emotional, and academic skills all children need to productive global citizens beyond the doors of Centreville Elementary.
