School Annual Education Report (AER) Cover Letter

Dear Parents and Community Members:

We are pleased to present you with the Annual Education Report (AER) which provides key information on the 2016-17 educational progress for Centreville Jr/Sr High School. The AER addresses the complex reporting information required by federal and state laws. The school's report contains information about student assessment, accountability, and teacher quality. For the 2016-17 school year, schools were identified using new definitions and labels as required in the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). A Targeted Support and Improvement (TSI) school is one that has at least one underperforming student subgroup. An Additional Targeted Support (ATS) school is one that has three or more underperforming student subgroups. A Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI) school is one whose performance is in the lowest 5% of all schools in the state. Some schools are not identified with any of these labels. In these cases, no label is given.

I am pleased to report that our school has not been given one of these labels.

We celebrate the achievements of 2016-17, but understand that there is still work to be done to increase the achievement up our lower performing students, as well as offering opportunities and course offerings which will continue to challenge and stretch our top performing students. We feel that by implementing a more uniform system of test administration, data collection, and focused feedback for both student and teacher, we can improve upon our past successes. We also believe that through continued intervention and targeted support, we can improve the performance of all students in grades 7-12.

State law requires that we also report additional information.

1. PROCESS FOR ASSIGNING PUPILS TO THE SCHOOL

Centreville Jr/Sr High enrolls students in grades 7 through 12 who are residents of the Centreville Public School District, students in grades 9 through 12 who are residents of Nottawa Community Schools District, or students who are participants in the St. Joseph County Schools of Choice Program.

2. THE STATUS OF THE 3-5 YEAR SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT PLAN

The Centreville Junior/Senior High School Improvement Plan was originally written during the 2012-2013 school year to accommodate the new Assist platform from Advanc-Ed. During the 2016-17 school year, the plan was reviewed on numerous occasions and revised for the 2017-18 school year. In the revision process, the staff reviewed their existing goals, strategies, and activities and adjusted them according to the progress that has been made.

3. A BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF EACH SPECIALIZED SCHOOL

Covered Bridge School: Covered Bridge School is an alternative high school located in the community education building. Covered Bridge School provides students with the opportunity to earn high school credits in a nontraditional setting. On-line classes are available through Ed Options and GenNet. Placement in the Covered Bridge School is determined by a meeting of the following participants: Jr/Sr High Principal, Counselor, Covered Bridge Teacher, parents, and the student.

Career Technical Education (CTE) Career Technical Education

(CTE) classes are held at six locations throughout the county. Host schools include Three Rivers, Glen Oaks, Sturgis, Constantine, White Pigeon, and Centreville. Centreville hosts two of the programs. Centreville High School students participated in the following CTE programs: Agri-Science, Automotive Technologies, Building Trades, Computer-Aided Design, Computer Information Tech, Graphic Design, Marketing Education, Medical Occupations, and Welding. Students are selected for CTE programs based on their career interests as determined by the student's Educational Development Plan (EDP). This process begins in the junior high and prepares students for a CTE program choice for the junior and/or senior years.

4. IDENTIFY HOW TO ACCESS A COPY OF THE CORE CURRICULUM, A DESCRIPTION OF ITS IMPLEMENTATION, AND AN EXPLANATION OF THE VARIANCES FROM THE STATE’S MODEL

A copy of our core curriculum may be obtained in the administration office. In addition, a curriculum guide is available in the Jr/Sr High Office. Our current curriculum includes all of the State of Michigan’s Academic Standards as well as the National Common Core.

This is the second year that Centreville Jr/Sr High School Juniors took the SAT. In summary, the Class of 2018 class outperformed the state on the SAT Total and the Evidenced-Based Reading and Writing Test. Tests results also indicate that 68.5% of Centreville High School Juniors achieved college readiness status in Evidenced-Based Reading and Writing.

Spring 2017 Test results show that Centreville Junior/Senior High students scored at or above the state average on the following tests: ELA Grade 7; Mathematics Grades 7 and 8; Science Grade 7, and Social Studies Grades 8 and 11.

6. IDENTIFY THE NUMBER AND PERCENT OF STUDENTS REPRESENTED BY PARENTS AT PARENT-TEACHER CONFERENCES

Each year the Centreville Junior / Senior High School holds parent-teacher conferences in the fall and again in the spring. The 2016 fall conferences had 69 or 53.4% of junior high students represented by a parent, while in the senior high we had 89 or 34.5% of senior high students represented by a parent. This compares to 2015 fall attendance numbers of 85 or 63% in the junior high and 92 or 35% in the senior high.

We also provided additional opportunities to enrich or involve students such as Quiz Bowl, Science Olympiad, Code Academy, Historical Society Club, Power Lifting, a Robotics Club, a full athletic program, and many other clubs and activities as well.

Here at Centreville Jr/Sr High School we will continue to focus on student achievement during the coming school year and strive to achieve even greater success. Our staff continues to demonstrate a dedication to the mission of delivering a safe, superior education through the application of best practices, quality feedback, and continual improvement through self-reflection. We look forward to working with parents and community members as we continue our success.
